Janovic lisatened to the angel. He finished third, rewarding VoJan, an entity since 1996, and winning the championship in a 12-year old Chassis Dynamics car.

"I was repeating the same expletive that I used when I won my first race," Janovic continues. "Holy s\*\*t, I just won the championship." Co-owner John Volpe (The "Vo" in Vojan) and crew-chiefspotter (and brother-in-law) [Greg Hanner were already eclebrating. Tire guy Greg Teraccianno, who has been with Janovic since the beginning, Damon Schoendorf and Jimmy Gumbert were also eclebrating. They had beaten back a determined challenge from Dennis Gada, who was looking for a record search chamingship.

Still, Janovic needed time for the championship to "sink in." Championships, he explains, "weren't my biggest priority. I just like winning mees, and when I don't, I want to at least run competitively,"

Six-time champion Bob Potter offered advice over the week leading up to the final race and them posed in Victory Lane with Janovic. Fox was among those welcoming him aboard. "All the accolades, o-mails, phone calls, interviews

since; it's sunk in," says Janovic, a racer since coming to the Speedbowt in 1987. "(The championship) is a bigger deal than I thought."

He's been a winner, scoring at least one SK check-

He's been a winner, scoring at least one SK check ered every year since 2002. Over that span he was never worst than fifth in the final point standings, orab-

bing third twice. But being the rabbit in a championship run was brand-new.
"I have never really been in that situation before," Janovic continues. "I've been second late in the season with a slight mathematical chance, but this was

season with a stight mathematical chance, but this was different."

When the team moved into the points-lead in June, "all the guys got excited," says Janovic. "I cautioned

them that there was a ton of time left and we really hadn't had any bad luck. "Let's not get too excited," I told them. "It could turn into great disappointment." As the weeks dwindled, Janovic got into i. "As much as I thought a charmionship run would be

racing background. I'm self-taught. I was building my late models, setting them up myself in a division with lots of room for interpretation. It was an area best left to the likes of [master chassis builders] Phil Rondeau and Jay Stuart, but I always had stubbom pride."

By 2001 he was at a point where "I didn't want to end my career without winning at least one modified race."

His heart was set on a Chassis Dynamics car knowing "a CD car with a good engine would at least put us on an equal basis. The rest would be up to me."

They wound up with the first car



Mike Paquette built after assuming ownership of CD in 1995. VoJan continues to campaign the car, a fact that gets them media-attention on the hiphest level.

"Mike comes to the Speedbowl and just stares at the car," says Janovic. "He is amazed that the car is still winning races." And it will be back in 2008.
"Once a season begins I'm
always anxious for that first win,"
Janovic says." I'm sure that will be
true again. Now, there is a championship as well."
